Isn't that the music shop guy!?

Some of you may recognize Ashley from his music store here in town, or know his voice from the mini radio show he used to host. And while he has been a music performer since 1989, and a music instructor since 2009, he actually has an 11 year history with SPBHS as well.

In 2013, Ashley started in the Child, Adolescent, and Family department as a part time DSP. He

later took a full time DSP position, then became a Case Manager until 2017, when he became a Child Protective Services Specialist for a year before opening his music shop. He did one more reunion tour with the children's department in the summer of 2019 to help for a few months, before leaving to focus on his music shop.

Beyond the jargon, the role of the development director, is fostering relationship between the agency, and our community.

Journeys— Adult mental health rehab services. Individual and group day support across multiple setting including in home, in the community, and at our Parkside Building. Case management, IPS, and other services are also available through Journeys.

Child and Family Services— Youth (ages 4-21) mental health rehab services are available for children and families across multiple settings including in home, in the community, in schools, and in our Center offices.

Pride— Child and adult Intellectual and Development Disability Services. For any individual with a State Waiver, we offer Day Hab, Supported Living, and Family Hab services across multiple settings in home, in the community and at our Parkside Building.
